### CITY OF MILLERSVILLE, TENNESSEE ORDINANCE 19-719

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE MILLERSVILLE CODE OF ORDINANCES, CHAPTER 90 - ZONING, ARTICLE III - DISTRICTS, DIVISION 11 - SUPPLEMENTARY PROVISIONS APPLYING TO SPECIFIC DISTRICTS, SUBDIVISION V - TRANSMISSION AND COMMUNICATION TOWERS AND STATIONS, SECTION 90-551 - INTENT OF SUBDIVISION.

WHEREAS, the Governing Body of the City of Millersville reviews its Code of Ordinances from time to time to ensure that the laws of the City meet the requirements of the local, state and federal laws and the desires of the City Commission; and

WHEREAS, the City may cooperate with other municipal and governmental agencies for certain public safety improvements for the benefit of its citizens; and

WHEREAS, the Governing Body for the City of Millersville has identified the need to amend Sec. 90-551 related to Transmission and Communications Towers and Stations.

**NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED** by the Board of Commissioners of the City of Millersville, that this amendment to Chapter 90 of the Code of Ordinances shall be made in accordance with *Exhibit A* attached and made part of this Ordinance as if copied verbatim.

### Exhibit A

Chapter 90 - ZONING

ARTICLE III. - DISTRICTS

DIVISION 11. - SUPPLEMENTARY PROVISIONS APPLYING TO SPECIFIC DISTRICTS

Subdivision V. - Transmission and Communications Towers and Stations

Sec. 90-551. - Intent of subdivision.

It is the intent of this subdivision to avoid potential damage to property caused by towers and telecommunications facilities by ensuring such structures are soundly and carefully designed, constructed, modified, and maintained, while ensuring such towers are compatible with the surrounding land uses. The purpose of this subdivision is also to promote and encourage shared use/collocation of such towers and antenna support structures as a primary option, rather than the construction of single-use towers. The standards of this subdivision exclude amateur and ham radio operators.

Antennas or towers for municipal services located on property owned, leased or otherwise controlled by the city shall be exempt from the requirements of this subdivision, provided a license or lease authorizing such antennas for the governing authority on an approved tower. The antenna and tower and associated authorizing license or lease shall be approved by the board of commissioners.

### CITY OF MILLERSVILLE, TENNESSEE ORDINANCE 19-720

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MILLERSVILLE, TENNESSEE TO AMEND ORDINANCE 18-697, THE 2018-2019 FISCAL YEAR BUDGET, AS PREVIOUSLY AMENDED BY ORDINANCE 18-704, 18-711, AND 18-712.

WHEREAS, the City of Millersville adopted the 2018-2019 Fiscal Year Budget by passage of Ordinance 18-697 on June 28, 2018; and

WHEREAS, the Governing Body approved a contract on March 4, 2019 to purchase property for \$220,000 that was not included in the original budget; and

WHEREAS, a budget amendment is necessary to the Appropriation Ordinance in order to reflect the actual finances of the City; and

WHEREAS, Tennessee Code Annotated Title 6, Chapter 56, Section 208 allows the governing body to amend the annual budget ordinance in the same manner as any other ordinance may be amended.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS OF THE CITY OF MILLERSVILLE, TENNESSEE that Ordinance 18-697, the 2018-2019 Fiscal Year Budget, as previously amended by Ordinance 18-704, 18-711, and 18-712 shall be amended as follows:

<u>SECTION 2 - APPROPRIATIONS:</u> General Fund - Appropriations Proposed for the General Government will increase by \$220,000 and change from \$1,060,639 to \$1,280,639. The Total Appropriations will change from \$3,067,429 to \$3,287,429. (Line Item detail attached.)

<u>SECTION 3 - ESTIMATED FUND BALANCE:</u> General Fund - The Estimated Fund Balance for the General Fund will decrease by \$220,000 and change from \$1,160,339 to \$940,339. (Line Item detail attached.)

# AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF MILLERSVILLE, TENNESSEE, ADOPTING THE ANNUAL BUDGET AND TAX RATE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 2018 THROUGH JUNE 30, 2019

Whereas,

*Tennessee Code Annotated* Title 9 Chapter 1 Section 116 requires that all funds of the State of Tennessee and all its political subdivisions shall first be appropriated before being expended and that only funds that are available shall be appropriated; and

Whereas,

the Municipal Budget Law of 1982 requires that the governing body of each municipality adopt and operate under an annual budget ordinance presenting a financial plan with at least the information required by that state statute, that no municipality may expend any moneys regardless of the source except in accordance with a budget ordinance and that the governing body shall not make any appropriation in excess of estimated available funds; and

Whereas,

the governing body has published the annual operating budget and budgetary comparisons of the proposed budget with the prior year (actual) and the current year (estimated) in a newspaper of general circulation not less than ten (10) days prior to the meeting where the governing body will consider final passage of the budget.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF MILLERSVILLE, TENNESSEE AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: That the governing body estimates anticipated revenues of the municipality from all sources to be as follows:

- SECTION 5. No appropriation listed above may be exceeded without an amendment of the budget ordinance as required by the Municipal Budget Law of 1982 T.C.A. Section 6-56-208. In addition, no appropriation may be made in excess of available funds except to provide for an actual emergency threatening the health, property or lives of the inhabitants of the municipality and declared by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of at least a quorum of the governing body in accordance with Section 6-56-205 of the *Tennessee Code Annotated*.
- SECTION 6. Money may be transferred from one appropriation to another in the same fund only by appropriate ordinance by the governing body, subject to such limitations and procedures as it may describe as allowed by Section 6-56-209 of the *Tennessee Code Annotated*. Any resulting transfers shall be reported to the governing body at its next regular meeting and entered into the minutes.
- SECTION 7. A detailed financial plan will be attached to this budget and become part of this budget ordinance.
- SECTION 8. If for any reason a budget ordinance is not adopted prior to the beginning of the next fiscal year, the appropriations in this budget ordinance shall become the appropriations for the next fiscal until the adoption of the new budget ordinance in accordance with Section 6-56-210 of the *Tennessee Code Annotated*, provided sufficient revenues are being collected to support the continuing appropriations. Approval of the Director of the Division of Local Finance for a continuation budget will be requested if any indebtedness is outstanding.

SECTION 9. There is hereby levied a property tax of \$1.00 per \$100 of assessed value on all real and personal property in Robertson County. There is hereby levied a property tax of \$1.00 per \$100 of assessed value on all real and personal property in Sumner County. SECTION 10. # NATIONAL PUBLIC SAFETY TELECOMMUNICATORS WEEK April 14-20, 2019

WHEREAS, emergencies can occur at any time that require police, fire or emergency medical services; and,

WHEREAS, each dispatcher has exhibited compassion, understanding and professionalism during the performance of their job in the past year.

NOW THEREFORE, the Millersville Board of Commissioners hereby proclaim April 14 through 20, 2019 as National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week in the City of Millersville, Tennessee in honor of the men and women whose diligence and professionalism keep our city and citizens safe.
